Our first review today is of an unusual book by Charles Foster which is a combination of nature writing, biology, philosophy, personal memoir it's not very definable, but it's already being described as a modern classic. Jon, tell us about the book you've been reading. Jon: You're quite right, it's not very easy to define. The end of the book is about swifts, those amazing birds which travel thousands of miles between continents every year. Presenter: It must be hard for a human to live like a swift. Jon: Absolutely! Foster can't fly! The nearest he can get to the birds is by standing in a tree and trying to catch insects. But this section has a lot of fascinating facts about swifts, and about other animals. In fact the whole book is very witty and engaging.
