This is one of the first and most influential books by Peter Wagner. Often quoted and lectured from, many phrases from this book entered the permanent language of the movement.

A more comprehensive and detailed book than *Your Church Can Grow*, this book attempted to bring forth both the newest and the most mature thought of the movement.

One of the earliest and very best books on the importance of community in church growth. Written by a pastor.

1987 *The Church Growth Ratio Handbook*. Pasadena, CA: Church Growth Inc.
A small book with a great idea about what ratios should be in your church in order to grow. Very practical book.

1983 *Adventures in Church Growth*. Washington DC: Review and Herald.
An SDA book published by two professors from Andrews University during the height of the Church Growth movement. Came with workbook for churches.

Evangelical researcher based in Glendale California who does annual research and then writes a book to inform church leaders about how the church can better serve and win the society around them.
