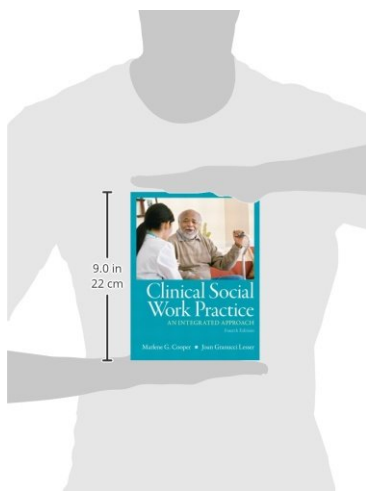

**This primary text for advanced clinical practice courses at the core of the Master of Social Work curriculum teaches students how to integrate theory and practice on multiple levels.**

Building on the foundation of generalist courses, this student-friendly text addresses assessment within a theoretical framework that considers the use of DSM-IV and the mental status exam; includes a walkthrough of a clinical interview and the stages of treatment; and examines models of treatment. The chapter on developing the psychosocial study includes a model that walks the student through the process.

Richly diverse case studies, drawn from practice experience, are integrated throughout and show how theory is applied to work with individuals, families, groups, and children and adolescents. Each chapter also includes learning activities, role-plays, and assignments that will help students master the content.

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Integrating patient social support navigators into the primary care team. Several clinical practices have published evaluations of the effectiveness of hiring dedicated facilitators or patient navigators to help patients access support services more easily. For example, a pilot project (COMPASS) commissioned by the National Health Service Greater Glasgow and Clyde (Scotland) showed how the primary care setting provided a "safe space" for identifying chronically unemployed patients who had multiple barriers to finding a job.<sup>51</sup> Having an employment consultant who worked with patients at their own...<sup>52</sup>

Overcoming barriers to adopting a social determinants of health approach in clinical practice. First, social work practice has been grounded on the belief that human behavior develops and can only be understood in the context of interpersonal relationships and social and cultural conditions. Thus, a key feature of social work assessment is its person-in-situation perspective.<sup>53</sup> The ideas put forth by the full range of relational theorists are not fully integrated so that there is not a unitary relational developmental theory. Drawing on both theoretical streams, this chapter describes what we consider to be major developmental relational concepts. It also will draw on recent research findings that provide some empirical...<sup>54</sup>

The very nature of clinical social work practice often necessitates brief contact with clients. Clinical social work is defined as a specialized area of social work practice that involves diagnosing, treating and preventing mental illness, and helping individuals address psychological, emotional, behavioral and/or social challenges that affect their quality of life. Such challenges include trauma, family conflict, physical illness and difficult life situations such as unemployment or substance addiction.<sup>55</sup> This field of social work is characterized by a holistic, person-in-environment approach; clinical social workers not only assess and help to address their clients'™ mental and emotional challenges, but also work to understand how clients'™ challenges interact with their family, financial and social lives. Social Workers are ideally suited to meet this workforce need for skilled integrated behavioral healthcare professionals. Social Workers are trained to work collaboratively with cross-disciplinary teams of providers, are prepared to work flexibly in a variety of roles and functions, and possess the necessary skills to engage with highly diverse populations. As healthcare becomes more collaborative, social workers are in a strategic position to redefine their place in healthcare and address emerging workforce needs as integrated behavioral health care leaders and providers.<sup>56</sup>

This special issue of the Clinical Social Work Journal is devoted to a contemporary problem that affects not only social workers, but in reality the entire field of psycho-therapy.<sup>57</sup> A group of social work psychotherapists were discussing the question of whether or not it was acceptable, useful or even necessary to integrate different theories into the clinical work they were doing. Medical social work is a sub-discipline of social work. Medical social workers typically work in a hospital, outpatient clinic, community health agency, skilled nursing facility, long-term care facility or hospice. They work with patients and their families in need of psychosocial help. Medical social workers assess the psychosocial functioning of patients and families and intervene as necessary.
