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Deviant behavior is the branch of sociology that concerns itself with behavior that does not conform to social norms and values. It is often associated with the study of criminology as a subdivision of sociology. Simply defined, deviance is behavior that does not conform to social norms and values, and in doing so elicits a negative response. Deviance encompasses both crime and otherness.
