News flash: the Bible is huge: about 611,000 words long, all divided up across 66 smaller documents called the "books" of the Bible. That's because the Bible is a collection of writings from different authors writing at different times. In some ways, that makes it easier to approach the Bible: we can read it in "chunks" rather than needing to read the whole Bible at once. But it also makes it a bit confusing. The Bible itself is a book. In fact, the word "Bible" comes from the Latin and Greek words for "book" (biblia and biblos, respectively). But it's a book of books. That means if you want t
